Tammy's sponsor is Sharon Williams. Her phone number, etc., are already listed in this year's yearbook.





Gloria Turner now liaison between WCC and Gulf Coast State College

Since becoming Liaison for Scholarships for the club, Gloria Turner has been doing a great deal of research. She has come up with the following report, which she hopes will clear many misunderstandings about the club's endowments and scholarships. Hopefully, this will help show where some of our money goes,



WCC Endowment Scholarship to Gulf Coast State College

The Club established two endowment scholarships to Gulf Coast Community (State) College, each for \$15,000. The first endowment scholarship agreement was signed on Sept.9, 2007 by WCC President, Nan VandenBerg. This is a general scholarship for a student enrolled in the college.

The second endowment scholarship is a Culinary Arts Endowed Scholarship and is for a student enrolled in the Culinary Management Program at Gulf Coast State College. This agreement was signed on April 4, 2013 by WCC President, Kay Vider.

Gulf Coast State College Foundation combines money received from all endowments to the college. The interest earned on the principal of all the endowments should be enough to sustain the scholarships in perpetuity.

The Foundation Board manages the fund and determines each year how much money will go to the recipients. Students attending Gulf Coast State College apply for an application to the Gulf Coast State College Foundation. Selection of the recipients for the scholarships will be made by the Gulf Coast State College Scholarship Committee. Both our scholarships are for students who reside in Bay County with first priority to Panama City Beach residents and second priority to Panama City residents.

For the last three years the Foundation has awarded \$1400 to each recipient, \$700 in the spring and the fall. Gloria Turner Chairman -Scholarship Committee 2020-2021
