

reachable.

For two months after the storm, she had no access to care and considered moving in with friends in North Carolina to get treatment there.

She said, "Things were difficult for a while.... I feel like I was caught in the middle of things. I was pretty worried because I didn't want to stay with friends, since I didn't know how long I'd have to be there." Then she learned about Florida Cancer Affiliates in Panama City. She was on chemotherapy at the center after that until she died in April.

Deborah was born in Michigan in 1950. She then lived in Cincinnati, Ohio and attended University of Cincinnati.

Moving south to Tennessee in the 70's, she raised two sons there before moving to the North Carolina Chapel Hill area. In North Carolina she spent 20 years working in a large non-profit Community Health Center organization. She retired in 2015 and relocated to the PCB area where her son and daughter-in-law, Felicia England, and her only grandchild live.

To be safer during Michael, she went into Panama City to her son's home. They were hit hard, but all huddled in the bathroom for hours. Her companion and best friend, Jim Cherry, stayed behind at the Beach house and had no damage.

Deborah was very talented. She loved art in many forms, reading and all the beautiful sunsets here on the Gulf.

She will be greatly missed by family and friends.

Deborah England joined the Women's Civic Club of PCB in November of 2016. She had been a vendor at one of the club's Spring Fling Arts & Craft Shows, and after meeting many of the members, she decided she would also like to become a part of the club. Her daughter-in-law Felicia England was a member, too.

She soon became active on various committees, especially the Arts & Craft Show, which was near and dear to her heart, and agreed to co-chair the show with Elaine Lichtenberger. This worked out well and the next year she herself became the Chairman.

About a year ago, she had certain signs and warnings that things were not right with her body. She was told she had lung cancer and only had a few months to live. She had only had two weeks of radiation therapy for lung cancer before Hurricane Michael hit.

Then Bay Medical Sacred Heart shut down its department where she got her treatments. Her doctor was un-
